

References in the main text and system of bibliographical entries

Bibliographical references should follow a modified Harvard system. Longer references should be given in the footnotes.

All works cited in the paper must be listed in a reference section at the end of the paper.

Please use an en rule to indicate ranges, e.g. 64–67.

REFERENCES IN THE MAIN TEXT

References in the text should have the following pattern: NAME date: page or preferably (NAME date: page), with the page range given wherever possible and necessary.

According to HANSEN 2012: 55 ...

... (HANSEN 2012: 55).

It is also possible to use acronyms. The list of acronyms should be given at the end of the paper.
